Inspired by a fantasy vacation in Fiji, Carsten and Ingrid sought the help of Low Country Landscaping, Inc. to duplicate the lush, tropical environment in their own backyard. Their home, located in the Highlands, offered tremendous opportunity due to its generously apportioned lot size.

Scott's Homeowner Lawn and Garden $Tips\ for\ the\ Month$

- Now is the time to change your seasonal color. Some deer-tolerant annual suggestions include cabbages, kales and snapdragons. While pansies and violas offer the most color in the cooler temperatures, you may need to offer protection from our everroving deer.
- For a DIY deer and rabbit repellant, mix the following ingredients thoroughly:

Two eggs
One cup of low fat milk
One cup of warm water
1/8th tsp Hi-Yield spreader sticker

Fill a small hand sprayer with the solution and apply immediately.

Discard any remaining solution, as it cannot be saved. Apply every

14 days or more frequently if it rains.

- When installing your seasonal color, a greater impact is achieved with areas of concentrated color rather than individual, widely spaced plantings.
- 4. When choosing colors of annuals, keep it simple and select one or two colors that coordinate well with your home's exterior and existing landscape.
- Two wonderful perennial shrubs to install this month offering color until the winter holidays are Encore Azaleas and Knock-out Roses. Both of these varieties will offer color multiple months of the year with minimal care.
- 6. Landscape lighting extends the beauty of your landscape as our days get shorter and adds security to your home. Consider having a low-voltage landscape lighting system installed to highlight your landscape and home's most beautiful features.
